INTEGRITY COMMISSION





• The prevention of Corruption Act, Chapter 105, Revised Edition 2011 provides for establishing the Integrity Commission.



• To promote integrity and tackle corruption and misconduct, to which investigations and hearings are the main tools to achieve its objective.



 To combat corruption through developing, implementing and enforcing anti-corruption legislation, policy and initiatives.

OTHER LEGISLATIVE BODIES FORMED AND IN PROCESS

Protection of Witness Act, 2022





 Protection of witnesses in criminal proceedings and the ability of a witness to give testimony in judicial proceedings and cooperate with law enforcement authorities.



• An aim is to increase the rate of successful prosecutions with an additional aim to protect the witnesses of criminal acts.

Justice Protection Act, 2011





 Section 4 of the Justice Protection Act mandates establishing a Justice Protection Programme and agencies.



• Protects witnesses and victims of crime

PROTECTION OF WHISTLEBLOWERS

Protected Disclosure (Whistleblowers') Bill, 2021





• An act to combat corruption and other wrongdoings or improper conduct in the public and private sector



• Enabling whistleblowers to confidently and securely "blow the whistle" on acts of corruption

Civil Asset Recovery Bill, 2022





• An act to provide for the civil recovery of the proceeds of unlawful conduct



• Deterring corruption by convicting corrupt officials and recovering stolen assets through the civil courts.

INVESTIGATIONS IN PROCESS





• Previous public officials are under investigations



• Gazettes are published in accordance with Section 14 of the Prevention of Corruption of Public Life of people who were non-compliant.
