WHY DOES YOUTH ENGAGEMENT MATTER?

Young people have energy, creativity and a desire to change things

In the Americas there are more than 162 million persons between the ages of 15 and 29.



This represents 25% of the region's population.

Engagement teaches you:

Teamwork

How to communicate your ideas

How to organize activities How to solve challenges

Engagement strengthens the community and enables us to exercise our rights and citizenship responsibilities

DEMOCRACY IS BUILT THROUGH ENGAGEMENT

To engage means to vote, to put forward proposals in the student council or to represent ourselves in youth parliaments, but there are also other ways of engaging and they all matter:

State your views and join in debates at school

Participate in environmental projects.

Stand up for everyone's rights.

Express yourself through art.

Participate in sports – they are a means of enjoying life together and organizing ourselves

Use networks to share ideas and promote causes.

Involve yourself in decision-making and democratic processes at school, in the community or nationally.

> All this is also democracy!

FORMS OF PARTICIPATION THAT MAKE A DIFFERENCE

According to Hart's ladder (1992) these are the experiences that really make your voices count:

LEVEL 8

Projects where, right from the start, decision-making is shared between young people and adults.

LEVEL 7

A project is proposed and managed by young people and the adults only provide support if they are asked to do so.

The adults launch the initiative but make decisions together with the young people.

The goal is to create spaces where youth input is listened to, considered and shared with the community.

SCHOOL, FAMILY AND COMMUNITY: THE PLATFORMS FOR ENGAGEMENT

Youth engagement begins in the most familiar, everyday places.

SCHOOL

Voice opinions with respect.

Make decisions together.

Resolve conflicts peacefully.

Listen to different points of view.

FAMILY

Discuss values and rights. Share daily decision-making.

Practice empathy and solidarity. Develop the confidence to contribute

in other spaces.

COMMUNITY

Participate in collective projects (environmental, cultural, social).

Identify challenges and propose solutions.

Strengthen your sense of belonging and responsibility.

Connect across the different generations.


